

Outdoor Entertaining

New barbecue restaurant Back Deck opened in Downtown Crossing in June. Two deck spaces can be rented for private events: The Upper deck accommodates 60 for cocktails or 40 for dinner meetings, while the Washington Street deck holds 35 for cocktails and 30 for seated functions. Indoors, the venue holds 128 for meetings in the dining room and 178 for cocktails. An event menu offers barbecue favorites with a twist, such as Greek-style lamb kefta skewers and muffaletta sliders. (2 West St., 617.670.0320, backdeck boston.com)

Chef Tiffani Faison's Southern-inspired restaurant Sweet Cheeks added a beer garden adjacent to the dining room in June. The space holds 50 for receptions and 30 seated. The garden is decorated with Berkshire Mountain Distillery whiskey barrels and has a retractable roof. The restaurant is also available for buyout and accommodates 130 seated and 200 for cocktails. The space is outfitted with six flat-screen TVs. (1381 Boylston St., 617.266.1300, sweetcheeksq.com)

The Fenway flagship location of Jerry Remy's Sports Bar & Grill now has a temperature-

controlled roof deck with 15 50-inch high-definition TVs, a roof-deck menu, more than 20 kinds of draft beer, and views of Fenway Park. The roof deck accommodates 200 people. (1265 Boylston St., 617.236.7369, jerryremys.com)

4. Tavern on the Water opened a sand bar—a pier covered with seven tons of sand—in May. It accommodates 100 seated or 200 for receptions and offers a view of the Boston skyline as well as the waterfront. Additionally, the pier can accommodate 50 for semiprivate events in sectionedoff spaces. Menu options include beach-themed meals such as crawfish

boils, clambakes, and barbecues. (18th St., Pier 6, 617.242.8040, tavernonthe water.com)

5. In Sharon, about 20 miles south of Boston, Saphire Estate hosts alfresco events at its lakefront property. The estate opened in 2006 and was renovated in February 2012. An open-air courtyard surrounded by lush gardens is available for receptions. It accommodates 300 for cocktails or seats 160. The menu offers eclectic fare such as lobster pot pie and Israeli chopped salad with falafel croutons. Full audiovisual capabilities are offered. Salon

Blow-dry salon Blo opened a Boston outpost in July. The sunny space can host small groups; it can provide eight services at a time. Staffers can serve appetizers and champagne, or outside catering can be arranged. "Blo on the Go" can bring services offsite. (437 Columbus Ave., 617.262.0105, blowmedry .com)

As roving entertainment, the company can body paint models or waitstaff with custom stencils, and jewelry embellishments and custom headpieces are also available.



In the Works

 Jason Santos, the edgy chef known for his stint on Hell's Kitchen, his wild blue hair, and the experimental fare he serves at his other local restaurant, Blue Inc., had a new spot in the works at press time. Called Abby Lane, the restaurant was slated to open on Tremont Street in late 2012. The 200-seat space will be geared to both visitors and

locals, serving breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Expect casual menu items like lobster rolls and pizza.

· Another big-name chef, Ming Tsai, also began working on a new venue this fall. Though the name and exact location of Tsai's restaurant project have yet to be released, the Chinese restaurant will open in the Fort Point neighborhood, which already boasts restaurants from foodworld luminaries such as

Barbara Lynch.

• In spring 2013, Faneuil Hall will welcome Boston's first venue made entirely of ice. Dubbed Frost Ice Bar, the quirky spot for group entertaining will offer music and cocktails to ward off the chill of the 24-degree interior.

· For something a bit more traditional and meetingfriendly, the classic Palm Steakhouse will reopen this spring in the lobby of One International Place.

With an outdoor dining deck and more than 300 seats, the venue will be larger than Boston's former, recently shuttered Palm location.

· Liberal Servings, a mixeduse venue with a performance space, restaurant, and bar, is slated to open in Harvard Square in the spring. From the owners of Beehive, the space will have a bohemian vibe and offer live jazz and more than 300 seats.
