### BABYLON CHANDELIER

Frenchman Alexis Tricoire is famous for his vegetal designs, and recently released the Babylon Chandelier (Lustre Babylone), a micro-landscape suspended in a bubble light. The beauty of this fixture is the codependent nature of its elements: the energy-efficient bulb provides light that feeds the plants inside the fixture, while the plants filter the light like a lampshade. ### ANDREA

The first air-filtration system to use the natural absorptive and metabolic properties of household plants to eliminate airborne pollutants, ANDREA was created by French designer Mathieu Lehanneur and Harvard University professor David Edwards. Acting as a “living filter,” ANDREA employs active plant filtration to provide a multistage system that cleanses air of harmful toxin gases. Its whisper-quiet fan draws in polluted air and passes it across the leaves and root system of the plant. Additional water and soil filtration also absorb harmful pollutants before releasing clean air back into the room environment. ANDREA is 100-percent ozone free and uses no replaceable air filters. Any kind of household plant can be used as the filtration agent, offering the owner customization of the unit so it matches the surrounding décor. [andreaair.com](http://andreaair.com)
